



COTGRAVE FESTIVAL AWARDED NATIONAL LOTTERY GRANT!!

The Cotgrave Festival has been awarded a grant of over £9,000 to purchase equipment for use at future Festivals. Late last year the committee, in consultation with Cotgrave Town Council, put forward a bid to 'Awards for All' in order to purchase some of the items which for past Festivals had to be hired in at considerable expense. 'Awards for All' recognised the splendid work the Festival did towards drawing all elements of the community together and agreed to fund the bid in its entirety.

"We are delighted" said Gordon Marsh the Festival Chairman. "This will be the fourth year we have run a Festival and the number of people attending has increased each year. This equipment will help us keep costs down and the value as high as we can. We are of course most grateful to Rushcliffe Borough Council for providing grants in previous years and for the last time in 2015".

Vance Wood the Chairman of Cotgrave Town Council said "Cotgrave Town Council is delighted that Cotgrave Festival's success in recent years has been recognised with the award of a substantial National Lottery Grant. The Festival Committee works tirelessly to organise an event which becomes more popular and successful, each year. We are immensely proud of the forward-looking committee and their team of helpers, and I ask residents to join the group, to share the workload and sense of satisfaction that follows".

The 2015 Festival will take place on **Saturday 20th June** and will be bigger than ever. Last year's new events, The Classic Car Show and Wheelbarrow racing will be developed and Egg Throwing and Caking Baking will be introduced for the first time. The ever popular Dog Show will allow Cotgrave dog lovers to show off their hounds and there will be a full program of arena events. See you there.

Don't worry if you think someone else might have already reported a fault - it's better to have it reported more than once than not at all!



Peat bogs are an important environmental resource and create areas of huge biodiversity, keeping more carbon dioxide out of the atmosphere than forests and also helping to prevent flooding. Mined and damaged peat bogs are contributing to climate change by releasing stored up carbon into the atmosphere, in this way they are as important as rainforests. Peat companies are destroying these fragile ecosystems. Endangered plants are Butterwort Sundews and Bog Rosemary and wildlife damaged are dragonflies, frogs and birds.

So making your own compost makes perfect sense (after all peat is similar to compost as it comes from the sedge grass broken down and rotting over thousand of years). One way to understand the blend of ingredients in your compost pile is by using the carbon nitrogen ratio (C/N) but quite frankly the chance of the average person measuring and monitoring the carbon and nitrogen quantities of all their organic material is almost nil. It is helpful to understand one or two of the common waste products generally used in making compost.

Grass cuttings for example have a C/N ratio of 12-19 carbon and 2.4 nitrogen, dead leaves have 54 parts of carbon and 0.9 nitrogen. A good C/N ratio for a compost pile is between 20/1 and 35/1. That's 20 parts of carbon to one part of nitrogen. Up to 35 parts of carbon to one part of nitrogen a good average being 30 to 1. So it can be seen that a mixture of dead leaves and grass cuttings would come within that range.

For micro organisms carbon is the basic building block of life, and a source of energy. Nitrogen is also necessary for protein, genetic material and cell structure. Micro organisms that digest compost need about 30 parts of carbon for every part of nitrogen they consume.

An interesting fact is that horse manure after it has been allowed to break down for a few months has the ideal C/N ratio of 25-30 to 1.6 nitrogen.

Friends of Cotgrave Country Park

It gives me great pleasure in presenting my first annual report as Chairman of FoCCP.

Over the past year I have found the role challenging, interesting and varied. As a person who believes in the community of Cotgrave it has been an honour to hold this position throughout the year. Over 2014 we have held 8 meetings with an average attendance of 14.

Firstly, I give thanks to my officers. Secretary Ernie Spencer who is by now the longest serving committee member of the group and also maintains his dedicated involvement within the park with Candleby Lane School and the Move and Mingle fitness group. Treasurer Yvonne Wilson who is responsible for keeping control of the finances. Lynne Domaine, Wildlife Officer, has kept us informed with her many interesting sightings throughout the year. Our County Council Countryside Officer, Lee Scudder, has once again led various teams of volunteers on working parties. The main tasks I will mention later but for now I would like to commend Lee for his never ceasing contribution of enthusiasm and dedication within the group and the park. Thanks to you all.

2014 started with the felling of many trees near the car park. This was the first phase of building for the new development. We must expect some inconvenience during the building work but hopefully this will be kept to a minimum. We lost the use of our car park during the re-alignment of Hollygate Lane but the result is a new, slightly larger, car park with much improved exit onto the main road. The plans show the estate bordering the park perimeter in what appears to be a very well planned piece finished. of landscaping. Overall. when ľm confident the result will be very pleasing and will allay the fears of some park users. As the development grows I would hope we will be able to welcome new residents to our group.

Throughout the year we have had 22 task days led by Lee and my thanks go to all those who volunteer their own time to be involved in these necessary jobs within the park. We have seen the addition of two new seats at the Western view point, an area popular with park users. At the Northern highpoint the arduous task of hedge layering has resulted in yet another view point. A new route for horses was made, from the canal bridge into the

Western side of the park, thus preserving the condition of the tow path. An ongoing program by the County Council to improve Leaky Hollow will encourage reeds and plant cover thereby enticing much needed waterfowl onto the water. Two very enjoyable task days involved parents and children from the village. A sensory and wildlife garden was planted with donated plants plus fruit trees, from local businesses. These same groups along with the local army cadets carried out another task of forming the figures 1914-18 using land scrapes sown with poppy seed as a reminder of WW1. Group members, Sue and Steve Smith, keen Geocahcers, have introduced a new course to the park. This could result in more people visiting the park as I met two people from Ashby de la Zouch solving the clues. An extra addition was a commemorative seat presented by the family of the late Cllr Eric Woolsey. Eric did so much for Cotgrave and appropriately the seat is sighted on Colliers Mount looking back across Cotgrave, the place he loved.

Our wish for a colliery memorial in the park has made some progress but funding through the section 106 agreement appears to have stalled with monies being given elsewhere. Funding from other sources will have to be sought, the main one being the Heritage Lottery Fund. The public survey questionnaire has continued throughout the last two months and early replies are showing encouraging signs of support.

The multi user footpath planned for the park to replace the old mineral line from the colliery to the River Trent has come to a halt. Money for this has fallen foul of the economic climate but perhaps other methods of funding could be sought to progress this.

Unfortunately an act of vandalism resulted in the "Pagoda" being destroyed in an arson attack. This has left such a scar that as a group we need to look at putting something else in its place.

The summer months saw various events take place. Three to note were, a very successful charity run where over 300 runners took part and raised $\pounds 10,000$ for the charity 'Rett'. This was such a success that it may now become a very welcome yearly event.

Secondly, at the Cotgrave Festival, we entered a wheelbarrow competition based on the personal theme of the many groups/organisations in Cotgrave. Many thanks to members Bill and Elizabeth Handbury for organising and decorating our group entry.

Lastly to Cotgrave Diamonds Angling Club who have done so much for the benefit of Heron Lake.



The installation of the new fishing platforms is now complete and I thank their members for the way the lake and its surrounding areas are looked after. Their annual charity match in aid of Ash Lea School is now a firmly established event and the time they devote to the pupils of the school on fishing days is worthy of note.

Earlier in the year the idea of establishing a local volunteer warden scheme was launched. This has now gathered momentum and we have 5 wardens patrolling and interacting with the public to enhance the benefits of the park. Hopefully this may lead to bigger and better things for the park.

NEW SCHOOL BUILD UPDATE

SOUTH NOTTINGHAMSHIRE

Following a meeting on the 10th December, I can confirm that the build process has been delayed until March 2015 this will mean a completion date of summer 2016. As we are part of the Priority Schools Building Programme, this is not within our control but on reflection it actually suits the school more in terms of a move in date, organisation and logistics.

Of course, this is tinged with sadness as the school / community swimming pool has now been closed. This has been a great facility for many years and enjoyed by young and old over many generations. I would like to go on record to thank all of the ROTSPA volunteers for their tireless efforts and the Governing Bodies of both Dayncourt and SNA for funding the ongoing costs - without either group, the pool would not have been such a success.

JORDAN CLARKE GAINS PLACE AT TOP US UNIVERSITY



Jordan from South Nottinghamshire Academy has won a place and a financial aid package to study at Northwestern University after participating in the Sutton Trust's US Programme run in partnership with the US-UK Fulbright Commission. Last summer, Jordan was one of 175 students selected for a summer school in the US at either Yale or Harvard University, or the Massachusetts Institute

of Technology (MIT), spending a week living on campus and visiting a number of other American campuses. Jordan benefited from residential activities and received an intensive programme of support, delivered by the US-UK Fulbright Commission over a number of months before and after their US visit, which covered admission tests, college choices and the application process.

Jordan competed with 2,200 applicants to win one of 175 places on the programme. The aim of the US Programme is to encourage academically talented, low and middle income British students to consider studying at American universities. The 2014-15 programme cohort comes from across the UK and 70% of the students will be the first in their family to go to university.

PUPIL NUMBERS CONTINUE TO INCREASE

Once again, the continuing success of the Academy has led to an increase in prospective 2015 students from our feeder schools. However, we won't become too large but we do anticipate that we will reach our targeted capacity of 120 students per year group from Years 7-11 and 150 students in our sixth form very soon (750 students in total).

COTGRAVE COMMUNITY SPEED WATCH



As we are now at the year end with the Cotgrave speed watch the group thought it may be of interest to you to publish a brief analysis of results taken throughout 2014.

Of the 30 watches that took place over the year a total of 375 vehicles were recorded over the speed limit. A breakdown of those figures can be seen below.

30-39 mph	40-49mph	50mph +

Our sessions last for 1 hr so that is equivalent to a total of 12.5 vehicles recorded per hour. This would equate to 125 over a 10 hour working day. Frightening when you think of how narrow Cotgrave's roads are and even more frightening when you realise that three of the roads we monitor are approaching schools.

None of the sites we monitor is more than ¹/₄ mile from the edge of the village so in relation to time taken to travel that distance by doing 30MPH and 40MPH is about 12 seconds longer at the correct speed. The difference between hitting a child at those speeds is that at 30MPH they will have a chance of survival at 40 MPH you will almost certainly kill them.

IS A LIFE WORTH 12 SECONDS.

As a driver you need to realise that the control of the vehicle is your responsibility. It's no good blaming anyone else if you have an accident. Driving too fast gives you less time to identify the hazard so reaction time is less. It also lengthens your overall stopping distance. You need to be aware of your surroundings, think ahead and drive appropriately. Believe me it doesn't take you that much longer to get to your destination and you will have done it safely. By driving at 10MPH over the limit doesn't mean you get there any earlier. You have no idea what you will meet ahead of you. Many a time I've been overtaken on Plumtree Road within the 40MPH section. When I reach the traffic lights at the Plumtree crossroads they are just turning to green and the same vehicle is just starting to move off. What does that tell you?

The community speed watch team will continue a similar pattern of watches in 2015 and pass on the findings to the police. Please remember that we are not out to persecute motorists, our objective is to make people aware of the speed limit within Cotgrave. We do get the odd aggressive driver who deems us a waste of time but believe me that is far outweighed by the many compliments we get from others. The most frequent comment we get is, THANK YOU

Also please remember that the speed limit, whether 30 - 40 or 60mph, *is not* a must do, it is nothing more than a safe maximum limit and in Cotgrave that limit is 30 mph which in itself may be too fast. Cotgrave's roads weren't designed for modern day traffic so please drive appropriately.

If after reading this you would like to help out with the team then you would be most welcome. About 2 to 3 hrs <u>per</u> <u>month</u> of your time is all that is needed. The more volunteers we have the more locations we can cover.

Transforming Cotgrave - a happening place!

Town centre

Rushcliffe Borough Council has secured Government Growth Deal funding to support major employment and housing sites alongside the A46.

The funding will be used for improved infrastructure to land north of Bingham, and at RAF Newton, and some of the funding will be allocated to help regenerate Cotgrave town centre.

However, there are no clear timescales at present for when this work will start. It will take between 1 and 2 years to start developing the town centre. This is because we have to propose the improvements, gain planning permission and then tender for building contracts.

When there is more news to share, we'll share it straightaway via Facebook and Twitter, Cotgrave websites, and the Borough Council website.

In the meantime, Cotgrave precinct and the shop units are open as usual – so please continue to support your local traders.

Health Centre

The Cotgrave GPs are committed to supporting the town centre regeneration and are busy looking to secure funding from the NHS for a new and improved surgery. These things always take time, and currently funding is tight, but our aspiration is that the GPs secure new and improved premises for the future.

Heron Lake

Work is still ongoing to the drainage infrastructure systems on and around Heron Lake in the country park. This will continue until spring time and will mean restricted access for vehicles only, however pedestrian access will not be affected. The work is due to be completed before the new fishing season starts.

Footpath widening

There will be some improvements to the footpath between Hollygate Lane and Colston Gate in the Spring.

We thought it was time that our patients had an update about the health centre now that building has commenced on the colliery site.

Just under 500 houses are going to be built there over the next few years and this will have an impact on Cotgrave Health Centre. We currently look after approximately 7200 patients at the surgery and this could rise to 9000 patients when the houses are completed.

The surgery has always been a central part of Cotgrave and we wish to remain in the proposed shopping precinct. To do this we wish to build a new purpose built centre that will allow us to accommodate more patients and more doctors, nurses, administrative staff and allied health professionals to look after them. The limitations of the current surgery prevent us from expanding our services.

We are currently in negotiations with NHS England who are responsible for providing GP services to secure funding for a new surgery. We will be working very closely with Cotgrave Town Council in submitting a business case to convince NHS England to provide the funding for the new surgery in Cotgrave, this will allow us to provide enough doctors, nurses and other staff to provide a high quality service to the increased population of Cotgrave.

Until this last year, they have also attended Cotgrave Community Forum meetings, and councillors' surgeries. Some councilors serve on local schools' governing bodies. We are indeed, fortunate to have such dedicated people.

There are always operational challenges, but they have been squarely met. We have listened to residents, and have responded quickly and appropriately. We now have a Cotgrave Community Warden who works daily to keep our streets free of dog fouling, and to quickly tackle litter hotspots. Do please let us know of any location you feel needs attention. The budget reflects closely, we feel, our priorities to maintain our assets, to provide worthwhile opportunities for young people, and to improve facilities and the environment.

We believe strongly in effective communication, and have just launched our new website, which we hope to fine-tune in the coming weeks. Do feel free to contact the Council Office to make suggestions. Cotgrave Community website continues to be a resource for information-sharing, and, of course, Cotgrave Connections is our periodic newsletter which reaches the letterbox of all houses. There are also, of course, the noticeboards which display the agenda for meetings and news of community activities.

We always look forward to events such as the Safari Sale, and especially the Christmas Lights Event,

which in 2014 was well attended and had a particularly good atmosphere. Thank you to all those who complimented the choice, made by some young people in Cotgrave, of last year's Christmas tree. We are pleased you liked it! We all remember, too, our informative and solemn commemoration, spanning several days, of the start of World War One, culminating in a candlelit vigil by the war memorial. The words spoken and the poem read were a fitting expression of our gratitude and intention never to forget those who made the ultimate sacrifice.

Similarly successful was the Cotgrave Festival, now well established in our calendar, and soon to be enhanced by the award of a substantial lottery grant. The festival provides a variety of activities and experiences for all the community. The Committee, a group of dedicates residents, works tirelessly to ensure that there is always something for everyone, and if you have not yet been to the festival, please come. You will not regret it! However, there is always a need for more helpers to share the load.

Much of my and the Clerk's time has been spent working with our partners to develop the former colliery site, and to plan for the redevelopment of the Town Centre. The regeneration of these areas is no straightforward matter, but progress is now visible on Hollygate Lane, and plans are advancing well for the Town Centre. The complexity of funding and legal arrangements dictates the timeline, but we hope that you took the opportunity to contribute to the workshops and presentations organised by Rushcliffe Borough Council and the developers. We all felt it was important for you to have your ideas considered. Updates can be found in each edition of Cotgrave Connections.

If it is true that any place is an accurate reflection of the strength of its partnerships, then Cotgrave is, indeed, a great place to live. Rushcliffe Borough Council, Notts County Council, Metropolitan Housing, Barratt Homes -Wilson Bowden, the Homes and Community Agency, and Cotgrave Town Council meet regularly, at Strategic Board Meetings, to discuss the two big projects, and Cotgrave Town Council is always updated at its full Town Council meetings. Let us also remember those partners, too, who keep us well and safe: staff at the Health Centre, the police, Cotgrave Neighbourhood Watch and Cotgrave Speedwatch.

I would like to pay tribute to all those groups who provide worthwhile activities for people of all ages and abilities. We recognise the role the three highly successful schools play in supporting our young people, and, of course, parents, carers, and other community groups.

On 29 January 2015, I was delighted to receive confirmation from Rushcliffe Borough Council that the bid to bring funds to Cotgrave, as part of the expansion of the Growth Deal, has been successful. This means that we have money to invest in the redevelopment of the Town Centre. At the time of writing, the exact sum has not yet been confirmed, but this is clearly excellent news for us all. We are grateful to those who wrote the bid, and look forward to more detailed planning and delivery of that improvement to the Town Centre.

Finally, it is a privilege and honour to be on the Town Council. Such an experience gives one an unrivalled chance to serve the community. The future for Cotgrave is very bright, indeed. But only by working together can we grasp the opportunities we and others create. We are *all* responsible for maintaining morale. Let us all look forward to that bright futures.

Rise in precept to help our fight against crime in the midst of yet more funding cuts

Nottinghamshire Police Commissioner Paddy Tipping sets his budget for 2015/2016

Another challenging year of funding cuts has prompted my call for a 1.98% rise in the policing portion of the council tax for 2015-16. This amounts to an annual increase of £3.42 for the average Band D household.

The new average annual precept of £176.40 will raise an estimated £52.4m to be used in the fight against crime. I will ensure it is spent wisely and well in protecting all our communities from crime, with a firm focus on rural crime and the needs of rural areas alongside additional resources to prevent crime.

All in all, my revenue budget for this year is $\pounds 188.2m$ – smaller than last year by $\pounds 5.6m$, or $\pounds 10m$ less if you take into account inflation and a $\pounds 6.8m$ cut in the Government's funding grant. So, with no let-up of cutbacks in sight, we must make ends meet, fill our $\pounds 11m$ funding gap *and* continue to reduce crime and improve performance despite falling numbers of police officers and staff.

A tall order then, but tackling crime and reducing victims of crime remains at the very heart of our plans. These include provision in my budget for new and different ways of achieving safer communities, and changing the way the Force operates to make us more efficient. I am also protecting spending on community safety for schemes delivered with our partners, which will benefit all communities.

Adapting to our shrinking purse means continuing with our cost-saving and efficiency plans. But with less money in the pot, we have reluctantly had to accept that our recruitment plans need to be put on 'hold' for this year – though we will review the position after the General Election and the next Comprehensive Spending Review due to be held in the Autumn.

Be assured that I will continue to pursue all possible financial and performance benefits, and do my very best to protect front line services wherever possible.

- Your main or only place of work during the last 12 months, prior to the day of your nomination and the day of election, has been in the Parish, or
- You have lived in or within 3 miles of the parish during the whole 12 months before the day of your nomination and the day of election.

Therefore if you qualify under any of the categories above, then you would be eligible to stand for Cotgrave Town Council.
