Cotgrave Church School News!

Over the past few months Cotgrave C of E Primary School has seen many significant events take place. The children have had fantastic opportunities to meet some important visitors and celebrate various events.

February ended with the opening of our new playground apparatus, which upgraded equipment that had served the school for many years on the school

field. We were lucky

enough to have Rt. Hon. Kenneth Clarke officially open the equipment (cut the ribbon and unveil the plaque) as the Member of Parliament for the area. Children enjoyed having the



opportunity to meet Mr Clarke as well as local councillors, Richard Butler and Christine Jeffreys to celebrate the arrival of the equipment.

This term, three new governors have been appointed to our school Governing Body. Ceri Skinner and Emma Neil-Dwyer have joined the Governing Body as Foundation Governors (Church-appointed) and Miss Burpee has been brought onto the Governing Body as an Associate Member, reflecting her position as Senior Teacher.

Alongside the new appointments, the governing body received some sad news this term as Mr Peter Barclay announced his decision to step down from the position of Chair of Governors and from the Governing Body. Mr Barclay had served this school faithfully as a Governor since 1989, as Vice Chair from 1995 and as Chair of Governors from 1999. Mr Barclay had worked alongside four Head Teachers; five Deputy Head Teachers; served numerous roles and had overseen the appointment process for many members of staff. We will mark Mr Barclay's long and profound involvement with the school appropriately later in the year as grateful thanks are due. The Diocese of Southwell and Nottingham will also be presenting Mr Barclay with a long service award.



In light of this development, the Governing Body has appointed Col. John Ludlam as the new Chair of Governors and Mrs Sue Hodgkinson as the Vice Chair. Both Col. John Ludlam and Sue Hodgkinson have had strong links with All Saints Church and

our school for several years and we welcome them into their new posts in the governing body.




One of the first jobs of the new Chair of Governors and the Governing Body will be to oversee the conversion of the roof space above one of our current classrooms into a new classroom. This will provide much needed classroom

accommodation and ensure that the high quality education recently identified by Ofsted continues as school roll grows. A grant for the work of £80,000 has been secured through Government funding for Voluntary Aided schools and school now has to find £8,000 to complete the work. £2,600 has already been pledged towards this target and fundraising events are planned for the coming terms to achieve the overall figure. Cotgrave Local History Project

Research into the past of Cotgrave is currently being undertaken by a number of interested individuals from the village exploring the names of streets, census information, the changing demographics, the occupations of village folk and their village houses over the decades/centuries.

A major part of the recent past is of course the Colliery from its initial geological investigation through the land development, to its full operational working and finally to its decline and eventual closure in 1993 along with numerous other collieries.



The Colliery at its peak had around 1200 employees but with less than 500 when it closed resulting in many many employees becoming redundant or taking early retirement. Most of these employees were miners relocated from collieries in the north of the UK starting a new life in what was once a small village in middle England.

The history of the Colliery and the social changes involving the miners and their families is an important part of our village history and needs to be recorded whether it be photographic, articles in local/national papers, mementoes of working life or just memories from former miners recalling their incidents of life at the pit.

We want to hear from you if you have anything to offer in this regard with the assurance that all information received will be respected and that any materials loaned will be returned.

Your involvement and recollections are vital in capturing this part of Cotgrave history and we would your participation.







Lee Cyrek, Manager of Cotgrave Colts Football Club, has won an award in the Unsung Football Hero competition run by the Nottingham Building Society (known as The Nottingham) for his devotion to the club.

The Nottingham's campaign ran throughout the 2015-16 football season and has found ten 'unsung heroes' who have shown extraordinary dedication and commitment to grassroots football.

Lee (35) of Cotgrave, was nominated by Danielle McGee, Treasurer for the team, who said: "Since he has become a manager he has encouraged the best from his 13 little lads and one lady. He has two teams, the Clarets and the Blues; they don't win very often but Lee believes at this young age he is there to guide and encourage them, to get the best out of them and not just be all about the win. "He is dedicated, every Thursday is training and every Saturday is match day and he does not get paid for what he does."

Danielle goes on to say that Lee also maintains the pitches, acts as a referee for other games if they need him and also raises funds for the club. She adds: "that is why I nominate him as my unsung football hero."

Lee has been playing for Cotgrave Colts since he was ten years old when the club first formed in 1991. As well as playing for the club for 25 years, he has been coaching an U8s team for the last two seasons and helping out with the soccer schools for U6s.



Speaking about his ethos at the club, he said: "The teams have fun. They look forward to the oranges and bananas at half time and come running off for them. It's normally a challenge getting them to eat fruit. We do get the odd wobbly but generally they just have fun."

Lee said his proudest moment was when the team went to Filey last year and gained the 'fair play' award.

As part of his prize Lee, who is an avid Nottingham Forest fan, is able to take three people with him to enjoy a game at the City Ground from the comfort of the executive box.

He will be accompanied by his dad, his brother and his coaching partner.

On this theme, parents and carers will have now received information about the additional school closure dates. As the programme is being managed by the Education Funding Agency and the contractor, we had no choice but to agree to the arrangements to ensure that the programme is completed properly and safely. However, this is a once in a lifetime opportunity for our school community and we are all looking forward to the next step in our exciting journey.

Update on Town Centre Regeneration and Employment Units at Hollygate Park

Progress is being made on both projects: The planning proposals for the employment site were submitted in April 2016. and we are still on track to submit planning proposals for the multiservice centre and town centre improvements towards the end of summer 2016. When planning permission has been submitted, the proposals will be available for residents to

Improvements will include:

- A new multiservice centre will be built on Scotland Bank to house GPs, police, library, Rushcliffe Borough Council contact point and Cotgrave Town Council
- Better landscaping so the shops can be seen from Candleby Lane
- Shop units will be improved to provide a fresh new look and improvements will be made to the appearance of the back of the shops.
- Flats above the shop units will be converted in to a new business centre.
- There will be a new play area and grassed areas.
- 15 new industrial units will be built next to existing units on Colliers Way.

COMMEMORATING THOSE WHO FELL IN 1916 DURING THE BATTLES OF:

JUTLAND—31 MAY

The Battle of Jutland took place between the British Grand Fleet and the German High Seas Fleet in the North Sea, off the mainland of Denmark.

During this short battle the British Fleet lost 14 ships, over 6000 British sailors were killed and over 500 were wounded. The German Fleet's losses were fewer than those of the British; although they lost 11 ships the number of sailors killed was less than half the British number. This was put down to the relative weakness of the defensive armour on the British ships. Despite the difference in losses the German Fleet retreated to German ports and never engaged with the British Fleet again during the war.

Commemoration of the centenary of the Battle of Jutland included all those lost at sea during the whole of World War 1. The service in All Saints Church on Sunday 29 May included a commemoration of the Battle of Jutland.

THE SOMME - 1 JULY to 18 NOVEMBER

The Battle of the Somme was fought during four and a half months of World War 1 on the Western Front between the towns of Albert and Bapaume.

The first day of the Battle was the Army's bloodiest of the whole war and the total casualties of the battle: 415,000 British, 200,000 French and 600,000 German made it the deadliest battle in world history.

Colston Bassett, Owthorpe and Cotgrave lost 10 men during the battle: Albert Berkin, Ernest Parnham, Thomas Parnham, Amos Shaw, Edwin Westman, John Hayse, Sydney Henson, Herbert Marshall, Arthur Simpson and Ernest Reeve. Their background and stories can be seen on the Great War Project website:

Cotgrave Country Park Chairman's Blog

When you think of a quarterly report for a magazine you think that three months is long enough to write something. With not a lot going on time goes by and before you realise it you are one week away from the magazine deadline (4 days actually) and you have nothing on your notepad to write about.

That's where I find myself, sitting here thinking what to write.

So my report for this edition may be lacking in content but there is always something that will interest someone so I hope this proves that.

Going on from the spring edition and heading towards summer nature changes things around you. We have lost the bareness of the woodland, the Autumn colours have long gone and suddenly the trees are starting to unfurl their summer display. Lots of new buds have burst into life and the late spring flowers are bowing out for another year. In Bluebell Spinney at the moment there is a good display of bluebells at the top end of the wood.

Bird life is very evident as the mating season is in full swing. Just this week (late April) I have seen Buzzards, Reed Buntings, Greater Spotted Woodpeckers and even a Tree Creeper and Blackcap (the first one I've ever seen) and all giving us a chorus of their own shrill songs. I often wonder why such a large bird of prey, like the Buzzard, has such a very quiet and somewhat feeble call and yet the tiny Chiff Chaff has a very loud melodious call. Apart from the crows I find the Green Woodpecker has one of the loudest calls in the park with its unmistakeable 'laughing' type sound. No evidence of the cuckoo yet but it is a little early. Nothing much of note on the ground as yet but there is always the resident cheeky fox to look out for.

No doubt you will have noticed the newly surfaced canal tow path. This area of the park belongs to the Canals and Rivers Trust and it is they that have paid for this work. I'm sure you agree it really is a marked improvement from the very wet and muddy towpath we have all been used to over the winter. Hopefully this improvement will rub off onto Nottm County Council and they will see how much more pleasant that footpath is compared to the one leading into the park from the car park. The butterfly bunds adjacent to Heron Lake came in for lots of criticism because of their appearance. These have now been levelled and will be reseeded to bring these areas back to their original state.

Our volunteer wardens are to thank for their work in trying to keep the park tidy with litter picking days. Certain areas seem to attract more litter than others but in the main I hope you agree the park is kept to a mainly litter free standard. It's a great pity the same can't be said for our canine friends. Time and time again the wardens and public report problems with dog poo. How do you prevent this? I wish I knew, along with the rest of the UK. I visit large parks and woodland in many parts during my travels and this is not just a Cotgrave problem. There are 8 dog bins around the park. Can I plead with all dog owners to please carry plastic bags and clean up and dispose of them correctly in one of the bins?

I hear that the much awaited multi user footpath utilising the old railway track is finally reaching the stage of being carried out. This will leave the park following the old colliery rail line and ending near to the lane that runs from Holme Pierrepont Hall to Radcliffe on Trent. It will make a traffic free link between the park and the river Trent all the way to Trent Bridge. Keeping my fingers crossed for this to be completed at last.



Since my last update Positive Futures had just finished their October half term programme, now we are in the middle of our school delivery, delivering lunch time clubs, afterschool activities, 1-2-1 sessions and year 6 PE around Rushcliffe.

Our delivery has been widened to more primary schools around Rushcliffe, thanks to our three new apprentices, Dwayne, Natalie and Max through the Royal Foundation, a charity supported by Prince Harry. These apprentices will be supporting mainly in our primary schools and for Natalie in particular with me in Cotgrave. Cotgrave's sessions have been very successful over the last few weeks as we now deliver 3 lunch time clubs at Cotgrave Candleby Lane school and two after school sessions (gym and table tennis). We are currently seeing about 45 young people a week in our lunch time sessions and 10 a week in our after school

sessions.



Positive Futures staged activities during the February half term and the Easter holiday. During February half term we had 63 different young people attend our 3 sessions (1 Youth and

sport, 1 sport and 1 gym) getting a total of 78 attendances throughout the half term. During the Easter holiday positive futures had 41 different young people attend our 5 sessions (2 Youth and sport, 2 gym, and 1 sport) getting a total of 66 attendances throughout the Easter holiday.

Another project Positive Futures delivered in the Easter holiday was the football accreditation camp. This was a project that was run over two weeks where 10 young people came to improve their football skills and complete the accreditation is reward for completing this we took the young people for a stadium tour of Wembley.

On behalf of Positive Futures I would like to thank Cotgrave Candleby Lane School for providing us with the facilities to deliver this project.



A big project Positive Futures also supported was the Christmas grotto at the precinct on the day of the Christmas Lights Event. This was a very successful project as me and a group of volunteers helped transform the room into the Christmas Grotto, it was over 2 days. We did this by wrapping many boxes and adding Christmas themed wallpaper to the walls. This personally was one of my highlights in 2015.



"Cotgrave & District U3A's very own Speakers' Corner"

Every month at our Open general Meeting we are entertained by a local speaker enlightening us on various topics of either general interest to us "Brits" or specifically to us Notts or Cotgravian citizens.

Here are two recent examples of what we learned.

History of Tea

The January meeting of our U3A was treated to a mouth-watering account of the history of tea by Linda Davey. Linda had experienced tea drinking in many parts of the world, including Japan, where the tea ceremony forms an essential component of Japanese culture, and was thus able to provide us with chapter and verse on the various subtleties involved. We learned (at least many of us learned!) just how wide is the range of tea types and how various are the techniques used in brewing it. I, for one,



was under the impression that tea should always to made with freshly boiled water in order to extract the maximum flavour but, apparently, this is a gross over-simplification. Green tea, in particular, demands water at a temperature of ninety degrees Celsius, one hundred degrees resulting in an over-emphasis



of the bitterness which is an inevitable component of any brew. Balance is all important, it seems, not only when learning to ride a cycle! Linda then took us through the history of tea in an academically precise study, emphasising the importance of the ancient Silk Road connecting China to the Mediterranean and, in particular, to India. She explained the process of planting, growing, picking and blending tea, an account which left us all feeling an enhanced degree of awe at its complexity Indeed, for many of us, the afternoon 'cuppa' will never be quite the same again.

St Anne's Allotments

At our February meeting we heard a fascinating talk by Mo Cooper concerning the history of St Anne's Allotments, an area of 75 acres, situated about a mile north of Nottingham City centre at Hungerhill. Gardens began to blossom there in the mid-nineteenth century when the better-off citizens of Nottingham felt the need to escape the ever-increasing



pressure on the City's space. Doubtless they owned splendid city houses but the influx of workers due to the expanding lace industry left very little room for gardens, a problem solved by the acquisition



of land outside the City centre. Small houses were built to provide facilities for entertainment, large glasshouses were established and the resulting blooms led to an annual rose festival held in the unlikely month of March. It still exists. At the end of the century, when Nottingham itself was able to expand, the 'bosses' left the gardens to their workers, who took the opportunity to grow both flowers and vegetables and, in

some cases, even to live there, a somewhat primitive existence devoid of gas, electricity or mains water! More recently, the 'allotments' have been turned into a community exercise, offering opportunities for deprived children to experience the delights of the countryside, whilst providing valuable supplies of vegetables to local people who till the land still available. There is currently a waiting list. The area is listed by English Heritage with a grade 2*. Open days are held regularly and there is plenty of opportunity for the public to visit. Sounds like a wonderful chance for the U3A Local History Group to arrange a day out.

Councils Report

I have had the pleasure in chairing recent meetings of the town council.

The town council continues to be very busy, looking after many aspects of Cotgrave life and I would like to record my appreciation of the hard work put in by the council's administration and clerical staff as well as the groundsmen and park keepers.

Forefront in many people's minds is the regeneration of the shopping precinct. This, along with the creation of brand new commercial and industrial units at Hollygate Park, means that Cotgrave is going to receive over £10 million investment.

Projects such as this are bound to be complex and sometimes time seems to go by without seemingly much happening. But it cannot be underestimated the amount of work that is going on behind the scenes by organisations such as the Town Council, Rushcliffe Borough Council, Nottinghamshire County Council, the Government's Homes & Communities Agency, and the Hollygate Park developers.

It has also been very encouraging to see and read about the support and enthusiasm being received from local shops and businesses as we all look towards Cotgrave's future.

It is expected that detailed plans and planning application for the precinct will be prepared for this summer, with the aim of planning permission being given towards the end of this year, and works to start early next year.

The new houses at Hollygate Park are progressing very well and residents are starting to move in. So a big welcome to Cotgrave! (Although I understand that quite a lot of the new houses are being bought by people and families who already live in Cotgrave).

Don't forget the Cotgrave Festival!

I am looking forward to this year's Cotgrave Festival which takes place on Saturday 18th June. This is now an established favourite in Cotgrave's calendar and I hope that you are all able to get along at some point. A small group of volunteers are working very hard planning the day and there will be a large variety of attractions and stalls. Of course, we can't guarantee the weather, but whatever, it should still be a super day for all.

More play equipment for Cotgrave - for all ages!

Last year, the town council received a grant of £9,750 from Nottinghamshire County Council, to improve the Grassmere play park. This was from their "Supporting Local Communities Fund" (SLC), which is for projects chosen and endorsed by the local county councillor to improve their areas.

The main changes were the purchase and installing of outdoor gym equipment. These are very popular and are suitable for people of all ages 7 to 70 - or even older!

If you haven't already seen or tried these, then do go along and check them out.

But soon there will be even more opportunities for outdoor recreation and fitness in Cotgrave.

This time at the Ringleas playpark.

The SLC Fund will be providing funding of £19,950 for new play equipment at Ringleas playpark. This again follows a bid submitted to the county council and together with match funding of £46,588 from the town council means that after some years of being closed and unused, Ringleas play park will soon be open again for all.

Cotgrave Neighbourhood Policing Team



A Cotgrave drug dealer caught red-handed by Police Officers, has been jailed for two years.

Ben Bond, 25, was found in possession of cocaine and cannabis in July 2015.

He appeared at Nottingham Crown Court on 17 February and pleaded guilty to possession of a class B drug with intent to supply. He was sentenced to two years in prison.

Bond, formally of Chennel Nook, Cotgrave, Nottingham, was stopped while traveling in a car with a woman who could not prove whether she was insured for the vehicle. A PC followed the pair to her home so she could check her documents. But while the PC was inside the property, a passing PCSO saw Bond take a bag out of the boot of the car and run off with it. The PCSO followed in his car and saw Bond run to the end of a cul-de-sac with the bag. When he emerged he no longer had the bag. A search of the area was carried out by officers and the bag was recovered. It contained cocaine, cannabis, a razor blade, deal bags and money. Further investigations revealed that Bond had been offering drugs he had for sale to at least 100 people in his phone book.

Sgt Steve Robinson said: "This sentencing is very welcome news for the community of Cotgrave. Bond's activities have been a concern for some time and they have no doubt had a negative impact on the local community. Thanks to the tenacity of the neighbourhood Police Team we have obtained the evidence needed to put a strong case together which has resulted in his conviction and imprisonment. We will continue to disrupt the activity of anyone who chooses to deal drugs in this area and we would urge the residents of Cotgrave to play their part by calling us on 101 with any information they have."

New Play Equipment for Ringleas Play Area

At Council's Meeting held on Wednesday 13th April, it was unanimously agreed to support the purchase of new play equipment for Ring Leas Play Area.

Council's Play Areas working group considered several options that had been put forward from various play equipment suppliers, and decided to put forward the design from Proludic Limited.



Council will receive a grant from Nottinghamshire County Council's "Supporting Local Communities Fund" (SLC) of £19,950 and Cotgrave Town Council will also fund the project with £46,588 (Total project cost £66,538).

Inclusive Play Wheelspin

The new equipment will include junior and infant swings and multi play units, sports equipment, play net and an inclusive play wheelspin.

We are hoping that the park equipment will be installed and fully functional for the summer holidays.
