



It is a new year and new programme for the Positive Future's team due to a recent 4 year contract extension funded by Rushcliffe Borough Council. We will be delivering lunchtime clubs, gym sessions, after school sport sessions and supporting events like Scout's weekend and Cotgrave Festival.

As part of the continued support and funding by Cotgrave Town Council, Max Murphy (last year's coach core apprentice) has become our level 3 apprentice to support me with the delivery of sessions in Cotgrave. As part of Max's apprenticeship he will be completing a level 3 in supporting the delivery of primary school PE and sport. Max would like to thank the Cotgrave Town Council for the opportunity and looks forward to supporting Cotgrave.



Our holiday sessions will be our next challenge and we have took a slightly different approach to the way our sessions will work. We will be delivering a football and cricket skill camp in which young people aged 10-15 years old can take place in fun and developmental sessions delivered by FA and ECB qualified coaches.

As far as my progress is concerned I am continuing to develop by getting as much training and qualification's as possible. I am also working on my level 1 swimming instructor qualification.

I am also completing a plan (get Active) for a project I hope to deliver in Cotgrave and other areas. The objective of this programme is to improve and provide support for the mental health of young people, we do this by keeping the young people fit and healthy through early morning fitness sessions, providing them with new skills like swimming, football, cricket etc. and finally by providing a support network during 1-2-1 sessions.

The Information Revolution; how it all started

A recent meeting of the U3A featured a somewhat 'different' talk, given by one of our own members, John Orton. John explained that he had almost taken up history as a career but had been seduced into science by the appointment of new science teachers at his school when he was in the fifth form. Having worked in scientific research for some thirty-give years, on retirement he had become interested in the history of science


and it was such a topic that he proposed to describe, namely the origins of the

'Information Revolution'.

The key discovery was generally taken to be the invention of the transistor at Bell Telephone Laboratories just before Christmas 1947 but its origins dated back to two earlier discoveries, those of the so-called 'cat's whisker' rectifier in 1874 and The need to extend telephone communications between far-flung US cities the telephone in 1876. demanded a series of repeater stations each incorporating an amplifier—though such a device did not, at the time, exist. This had to wait until 1908, when Lee de Forrest invented the triode valve and, being in financial

difficulties, was happy to sell the patent right to Bell. However, problems with reliability meant that Bells' engineers nursed a hope that, one day, it would be possible to develop an amplifier device made from a piece of semiconductor material, such as silicon or germanium. There were, however, serious difficulties in controlling the behaviour of semiconductors which were only resolved during the Second World War as a result of efforts to develop microwave RADAR systems. Research into microwave detectors based on silicon or germanium led to American scientists realising that it was essential to purify these materials to a much higher degree than had previously been thought possible and this led to better understanding of semiconductor physics to successful application of semiconductor to practical problems.

After the war, a team of scientists at Bell Telephone Laboratories was given the task of developing a 'solid state' amplifier and, after a number of false starts, succeeded brilliantly in making a so-called 'point-contact' transistor. There were, however, certain personality problems within the Group which led to an unfortunate split whereby the two scientists who were principally responsible for the





device, known as a 'junction transistor' which proved both more reliable and easier to manufacture. The fact that all three shared the Nobel Prize for Physics in 1956 partially melted the ice between them but, nevertheless, their relationship remained, to say the least a trifle cool As our speaker pointed out, even scientists are human and subject of personal foibles, rather like the rest of human kind!



- Summer / Autumn 2018: Demolition of existing library and police buildings, improvements to the car park, and landscaping of the area.

Nottinghamshire County Council News



Following the Town Council's successful bid and joint funding with Nottinghamshire County Council last year for the improvements at Grassmere and Ringleas play parks (have you tried them yet?!) further opportunity has arisen for us to submit applications to the County Council for further community support grants.

These were from their "Supporting Local Communities" fund (previously know as Local Improvement Scheme) where areas from across the whole of Nottinghamshire can apply for such funding. As you might image, there are always far more applications than there is funding available, so it is something of a competitive situation.

Applications were invited for the 2017-18 scheme and again we have made an application for Cotgrave. This time it's to improve the car parking area/surface at the Arthur Ridley sportsground on Colliers Way. This is where the ever popular Cotgrave FC hold their matches and training. You might remember our report about the event held their last September which turned out to be one of the wettest days of the year.

It highlighted how the car park needs a more appropriate and safer surfacing. The Town Council discussed this and agreed that it should put some funding aside to help and this will hopefully bring a positive result from the County Council too. The car park is so poor that many people park on Colliers Way, which is potentially dangerous for youngsters in particular.

The final decision as to whether the bid has been successful or not, will be known later this Spring.

Another projects that has been approved for support is the repair to the bronze sword, the improvements to the surrounding area and reinstatement of the disabled footpath at Cotgrave's war memorial. This will hopefully be completed during the Spring.

New interactive speed sign planned

Many people are worried about perceived and actual speeding on the roads. Sometimes people don't realise that they are going too quickly or over the limit. One of the most effective and popular ways of trying to manage this are the interactive speed signs that flash you speed as your approach. We have three already in Cotgrave on Plumtree Road, Main Road and Owthorpe Road.

After a long time of discussions (well over a year) the County Council has agreed to provide another one on Plumtree Road, facing the other direction, between the Scrimshire Lane and Rectory Road junctions, which should also help to slow traffic as it approaches Mensing Avenue - which has been a worry for a long time.

If all goes to plan, the sign should be installed in the next month or two.

I am constantly meeting new residents of Hollygate Park and I would encourage anyone with any ideas for the park to come along to our meetings. As I'm not sure when the magazine goes out it is difficult for me to give dates but all future dates can be viewed on the notice board in the car park or view them on the events section at www.cotgravecommunity.com or facebook at Friends of Cotgrave Country Park. AGM 2017 Chairman's Report

Once again it gives me great pleasure to have chaired the group for my third year.

2016 has seen a total of 9 meetings attended by a total 124 members. The number of task days have totalled 18.

Thanks to Ernie our Secretary – Never ceasing with his passion for the park and everything that goes with it. His educational days with local school children are always well received. Being one of the original founders of FoCCP some fourteen years ago his knowledge is vast and has certainly been of help to me.

Yvonne – as treasurer has had a quiet year in her position but is always ever willing to stand in for others.

Llyn Demaine who keeps us up to date with park wildlife has reported in the past year on the unfortunate demise of waterfowl both on the canal and Heron lake. This has been put down to the sighting of mink in the park. It is now known of two areas they frequent.

Leo Healy, our Town Council representative has kindly acted as our go between and his input is appreciated.

Lee and Sue our NCC representatives work hard to enhance and maintain the park, unfortunately with ever decreasing funds, but their input and enthusiasm never wanes. Lee is responsible for planning and maintenance which he puts into place during the task days throughout the year. However, little mention is made of his own band of volunteers who he brings with him. I would like Lee to convey my thanks to this group of volunteers.

Over the year Lee has carried out 18 task days where the main jobs have been to remove the earth bunds alongside Heron Lake after park users made comment that they looked shabby. These have been levelled and surrounded by posts to define what we hope will be an area used for families to picnic once again. One task day involved members of the Co-op management joining us. They used the event as a team building & bonding exercise. They were tasked with removing the many large stones which hampered the levelling of the bunds. I am reliably informed that they considered the day a success even though the weather conditions were horrendous. Hopefully we can use this type of help in the coming year.

Wardens – The volunteer warden scheme has been in operation now for two years and supported by NCC has steadily picked up in numbers to the present total of 8. It is my wish that we can recruit even more so we may become big enough to have our own task days to carry out even more landscaping and maintenance projects. Wardens have gone about their duties with a lot of eagerness and they have now become a valued part of the FoCCP community. I have had many favourable remarks from park users about their presence. I would like to mention the foot work carried out by warden Alan Peckover for walking and formulating 5 way marked routes within the park and hopefully these will be in place early in 2017. His task covered a total of 17.5 kilometres.

Ray Brown's passion for the park shows through in his very time consuming work to try and raise funding. He knows what he wants and sets about it eagerly. He has been rebuffed on occasions but nevertheless he picks himself up starts again. This is a very hectic job he has taken on and I'm sure Ray would be delighted to have some help from other members.

The park is becoming increasingly popular with various types of user and in early summer the Canal and Rivers Trust resurfaced the tow path much to our advantage and this has seen more cyclists coming to the park. Another new venture in the park was Buggy Fit, a club for young mothers who wish to meet to walk, talk and keep fit whilst still being able to have their children with them. A very successful event in autumn was the bat walk held by the WFT and this took the organisers by surprise when over 40 people turned up. Hopefully that can take place again in 2017. Dog walkers enjoy the park and make use of our dog swimming pool and other open spaces to exercise their canine friends. The local fishing club still have a very healthy membership and have had a number of successful competitions this year. Their charitable side still has a place in the park. The children from Ash Lea school attend the lake and are given fishing lessons under their supervision.

Unfortunately this year the lake fell foul to a fishing disease and the club took the decision to close Heron Lake. They contacted CFAS a division of DEFRA to investigate the disease. They identified the problem as KVA a fish disease that only affects the carp family. They were given help and advice from CFAS to rid the lake of the disease and things have now returned to normal and been given a clean bill of health. The situation will be monitored periodically by CFAS. I would like to add that there was no danger to humans or other wildlife. Unfortunately because of the closure it meant the club could not hold its annual charity match which would have benefitted Ash Lea School. I have no doubt this will return next year.

The housing development has moved forward at a rapid rate without too much disruption to the park and Barratts have planted many small trees surrounding the car park. The first part of landscaping to the park boundary from Hollygate housing perimeter has just taken place.

The top road and fishermans entrance has now been totally re-laid and at long last it has been announced that the Multi User Footpath is to go ahead utilising the old railway track from the park towards the river Trent. This will be of great benefit to the park by bringing users from the Radcliffe and Holme Pierrepoint area.

To keep up with modern media and more importantly, to promote the park, we have decided to build our own web site and also to resurrect the old Facebook page and link them both together. Thanks to Polly Jones and ex member Russ Hamer for taking on the roll of heading these two projects.

More fruit trees were planted near the old Pagoda site and although some didn't take there are a good many that did and hopefully these will bear fruit eventually.

In November, me and some of the wardens paid a visit to Rushcliffe Country Park on a fact finding mission to look at the sensory garden that had been made there. This is basically for children to get involved with sound and vision in nature. Although some of the items looked rather expensive it was decided that others could be home made and this will be progressed in 2017. A location has yet to be decided but it will involve a lot of ground work. The wardens along with NCC will meet to discuss this at future date.

It has always been my aim to progress the park. Over the last three years I have tried to do this. I have also become frustrated at the lack of progress. However, towards the end of last year there were signs from NCC that there may be room for progress with the mention of a cabin for the wardens and group use. Lee also has ideas for two nature projects.

There are some things that have been mentioned over the last year that have never transpired and I will be trying to resurrect these small but useful things for the benefit of the park... Of late I have looked at ways of trying to bring in new blood to the group to look for fresh input now we have the new housing to tap into. Just last week I looked at the Cotgrave U3A web site and looked at their walking section which meets twice monthly. I found that many local parks have had a visit, however, the country park, on their own doorstep was not mentioned. I will try to address the situation in the weeks ahead. We should all be looking at fresh ideas, nothing major just small things that may enhance the park to the budget available. I notice many children at a weekend with their parents in the park and this is one of the groups we need to encourage. There is more to being a child than television, computers and games machines.

Finally can I end by giving a big thank you to you the members for your continued support. Each and every one of you involved with the park is appreciated. It's not always possible to mention everybody by name but your help and support is greatly valued.

Chairman's Report

I write this report towards the end of January 2017, when the fog and frost are 'spectre-grey', to borrow a description from Thomas Hardy, and I am pleased to report that Cotgrave Town Council has been as active as ever since the last edition of Cotgrave Connections.

The weeks leading up to Christmas are very busy for the Clerk and the Administration Manager, and they always keep their fingers crossed that the weather will be fine for the switching on of the Christmas lights, in the town centre. I am delighted to say that the event went very well, indeed, and the queue to see Santa seemed longer than ever! The Senior Citizens' Christmas Party, held at Cotgrave Welfare, went very well, too, and the feedback from guests and others was extremely positive. I am sure that councillors will look favourably on any proposal to hold a similar event, later this year. Councillors were also pleased to grant £600 to Cotgrave Social Welfare Scheme towards the cost of putting on their annual Christmas pantomime for local schools.

As an expression of their commitment to supporting the development of young people in Cotgrave, councillors agreed to grant £100 to 1st Cotgrave Scout Group, so that they can plant bulbs in a location of their choice in Cotgrave. This will encourage teamwork and a sense of civic pride, and we look forward to seeing the fruits of their labours. We were also unanimous in agreeing to fund Positive Futures until 2020, so that they can plan their provision with certainty, and without the need to submit an annual request for a grant. We did not hesitate to move to funding in this way because we recognise that the work they do with young people has a positive impact on their personal development. Council has also submitted a bid to Notts County Council for funds to help to pay for an additional car park at the Arthur Ridley Sports Ground, home of Cotgrave FC. If successful, Council will have to match their funding, and we hope that the outcome will be an improved area where currently the drainage is not good.

In response to a request by a resident, a working party has been formed to look at the bus services in Cotgrave. There will be an opportunity to discuss matters with bus company representatives in February's Town Council meeting, and the outcomes, will, no doubt, be reported in the minutes of that, and in the next publication of Cotgrave Connections.

Councillors have appointed a solicitor to scrutinise the draft lease by which we shall be bound when we move into the Multi-Service Centre, when it is built. They have had the opportunity to read the draft lease, and to ask the solicitor for clarity on a number of clauses. When the solicitor and councillors are satisfied that their concerns have been satisfactorily addressed, they will take a final vote to join the Police, the Library, Rushcliffe Borough Council's Contact Point, and the GPs in the Multi-Service Centre. They have already voted, in principle, to relocate to the Multi-Service Centre.

There have been two meetings of the working group that prepares the budget so that it can be presented to Council for approval. The preparation of the budget is an important decision-making process that ensures that we meet the requirements of the law, and that we address Council's spending priorities. As you know, we, as well as Notts County Council and Rushcliffe Borough Council, provide local services and some support to local organisations. We also organise and support events that promote social cohesion. We employ a Clerk, an Administration Manager, park keepers, and grounds maintenance staff. In order to pay for our spending commitments, Council receives a small portion, calculated on a tax base provided for us by Rushcliffe Borough Council, of the Council Tax residents pay. I would like to assure everyone that Cotgrave Town Council takes seriously its responsibility for providing services that are good value for money. I would like to thank Councillors Gardner, Shaw, Healy, Jeffreys, and Wilson for joining the Clerk and I in the two budget preparation meetings.

Finally, on behalf of Cotgrave Town Council, I would like to thank all those who contribute to making Cotgrave a fantastic place to live. You keep our streets safe, educate our young people, provide opportunities for people of all ages, keep us healthy, and look after our beautiful Country Park, as well as the built environment. The work will soon commence in the town centre, and eventually make a difference to all our lives. Let us embrace the changes positively in the knowledge that we are all responsible for morale. Together, we can ensure a bright future for Cotgrave.

If you see a dog owner allowing their dog to foul and not pick it up, please gather as much information as possible, such as :-

- The exact location
- The offenders type of dog
- Description of the person in charge of the dog
- If possible, their vehicle registration and details of address of the person committing the offence.
