

# Superfast broadband coverage extended in Cotgrave

High speed fibre broadband is helping homes and businesses get connected in Cotgrave, with a new roadside fibre optic cabinet on Hollygate Lane.

The cabinet is helping around 40 homes and businesses in the village get access to fibre broadband for the first time, thanks to Nottinghamshire County Council's multi-million pound Better Broadband for Nottinghamshire (BBfN) partnership with BT.

Streets and businesses to benefit from the new high speed broadband services provided by the roadside cabinet include:

- Manvers Business Park
- Hollygate Lane
- High Hazles Road
- Hollygate Industrial Park

Better Broadband for Nottinghamshire has already made fibre broadband available to more than 70,000 homes and businesses across the county. A high speed broadband connection makes it easier and faster to do things online like download files, watch catch-up tv, join in online webinars and so much more!

At 50Mbps, a music album will take roughly 16 seconds to download, compared to more than three minutes on a 4Mbps connection, whilst the downloading of a high-quality film can be reduced from 50 minutes down to four minutes.

Fibre broadband is currently available to 96 per cent of homes and businesses in Nottinghamshire. The current BBfN rollout will take coverage in the county to 98 per cent by spring 2018 – maintaining Nottinghamshire's position as one of the best connected counties in the country.

Funding for the programme has been provided by a wide-range of organisations, including the county council, BT, Broadband Delivery UK (the Government's broadband delivery arm), D2N2 Local Enterprise Partnership and District and Borough councils in Nottinghamshire.

Broadband upgrades are not made automatically and businesses and residents will need to make arrangements with an internet service provider to access the faster fibre service once they are available.

# **Cotgrave FC**



Its been a busy 3 months for Cotgrave Football Club, with Club management changes, new teams, the 20th Annual pre season Summer Cup and the Clubs 25th anniversary trip to Wembley Stadium.

The Founder member of the Colts, Kevin Cooper, has returned as Club Chair and also a new Club Secretary in Paul Heard and one of the Clubs former players Adam Clark has taken on the role of Pit Ground Chair to try and improve facilities in the short and long term. A very busy summer saw the appointment of a new First Team Adult Management team of Daniel Smith, Luke Allison Gordon and Adam Gray, all 3 of them having played for the Club as young children themselves and they have made an excellent start in the Notts Senior League and reached the Quarter Finals of the Cup.

The season started with the traditional pre season Summer Cup, which has been an annual event since 1997. this year more than 1000 children from 120 teams around Nottinghamshire took part and raised money for the Club and also the purchase of a Defibrillator for the Ground.

Cotgrave Monarch under 8s excelled making the final of a 40 team event and our new Under 7s played for the first time and all the children received medals from members of the Town Council.



As a club we have worked hard so far this season on increasing numbers at the bottom end of the Club, we have a thriving Soccer School for around 40 children aged 4 to 6 every Wednesday at Candleby Lane School and the Coaches are a mixture of youth and experience, with Club Stalwarts of 20 years each, John Dale and Ian Goulding assisted by former Colts players and parents, Lee Cyrek and Mark Cope looking after the younger Children. The older section of under 6s are now being prepared for teams by club secretary Paul Heard and the latest addition to the Coaching team, Matt Cropley.

The under 7s have just started playing matches on a Saturday morning with more than 20 children split into 3 teams and our under 8s generally play on a Sunday and we now have 30 children in that section.

The Colts now have more than 200 children involved with the Club this season, which is the highest number since around 2002. We still have gaps in a couple of senior age groups and we are looking at ways in which we can possibly engage with more senior school children and, potentially, young ladies as we strive for FA Community Status.

The Colts section was formed in 1991 and as part of the 25th Anniversary 80 players aged 8 to 14 enjoyed a day out at Wembley Stadium to watch England play Malta. The Club would like to thank the sponsors who supported this event to make it possible for all of the children to go for a very low price. The sponsors were Soal Glass, PBL, Retail Assist, UK Football Tours and a donation from Nottinghamshire County Councillor Richard Butler.



## Cotgrave & District U3A learns all about a way of (Honey) Beeing

Our June meeting was favoured with a fascinating exposition on the life and times of honey bees by Alison Knox. Not only had Alison stepped in at the eleventh hour as substitute for the last-minute unavailability of the advertised speaker, but she did so on her previous day's return from holiday. Complete with work-a-day bee-keeping dungarees, she not only talked the part but certainly looked it too. We were extremely fortunate to hear her lively presentation. Alison's philosophy is well summed up by the following quotation which she used to introduce herself: "I am one. I cannot do everything, but I can do something. And because I cannot do everything, I will not refuse to do the something that I can do. What I can do, I should do. And what I should do, by the grace of God, I will do" (Edward Everett Hale 1822 – 1909). In Alison's case, that 'something' was keeping bees.

Bees have, of course, been around for eons, having only recently become domesticated in purpose-built hives (beespoke accommodation?) but it was sad to learn just how badly they suffer the slings and arrows of outrageous humans. Little did any of us know how badly Californian fruit growers treat their resident bee populations. They are dragged about by 'bee-brokers' on large tractors so as to be available at the right moment and optimum time to pollinate now oranges, then plums, then black currants and now grapefruits. They are denied any free time of their own to establish their natural habitats and social instincts. We are, of course, talking honey bees, a highly social breed and not to be confused with such outsiders as the solitary mason bees which live at the bottom of Scrimshire Lane in what may well be the oldest bit of wall in Cotgrave. As we frequently hear these days, honey bees are indeed suffering from human intervention but even worse are the deprivations of a certain Chinese mite which can infest a hive, live on its rightful inhabitants and reduce them to apian misery. It was estimated that the UK lost almost half of its bees during the last year, a frightening statistic for those of us who live on vegetable matter - and remember that farm animal's too do just that!

Alison described graphically how she interacts with her two colonies of bees, wearing a pair of Marigold gloves, rather than anything more sting-resistant, in order to treat her charges as gently as possible. Another nice touch is her use of a goose feather to sweep the odd stray from her clothing before re-entering the house. Each hive has a single queen who lays as many as two thousand eggs per day, about 5% drones who fertilise queens, not within the confines of the hive but at some stratospheric height and only on days with appropriately warm and humid conditions. The work, of course, is done by the dominant females who may fly as much as three miles from the hive to find suitable supplies of nectar - though Alison once won top prize in a local Nottingham honey contest as a result of her bees' choosing to pollinate lime flowers in her own garden. Such are the vicissitudes of bee-keeping! The depth of feeling she evinces for her bees was made clear by her sad description of the fate of drones at the end of the summer season, when they are evicted from the hive to die a lonely death, once their propagational usefulness has come to an end. I suspect that several of us men felt just a hint of fellow-feeling but bravely managed not to show it! However, the talk ended on a positive note, Alison pointing out that Nature will always out-think us, no matter how clever we may believe ourselves to be – it sounds as though bees will surely be with us for a while yet.

#### Nottinghamshire needs more trainee teachers says Cotgrave educationalist

A call goes out for interested parties to attend an open event at Cotgrave Candleby Lane School to fill Nottinghamshire's shortfall in teacher numbers

People interested in a career in teaching are being urged to attend a Teach Notts open event at the Cotgrave Candleby Lane School on 5:30 pm on 14th December to learn more about a career in teaching from the region's experts.

The reduction in available good quality teachers nationwide has led to a debate highlighting the struggle that schools are facing to recruit, one which experts say is leading to an expensive overuse of supply teachers. But a locally developed teacher training scheme called Inspiring Leaders is set to address that fall in numbers, and with a tailored approach which aims to provide more support to trainees than any previous schemes.

Recruitment may be a headache for Head Teachers says Paul Goodman of Inspiring Leaders, but that means a fluid job market for newly qualified teachers, "Recently we have seen a panic across the system to recruit because nationally we have seen a significant drop in the numbers training to teach, with Nottinghamshire the worst affected in our region. So, the need for new teachers is real and anyone training in the next few years will enter a very buoyant recruitment marketplace."

The open event at the Cotgrave Candleby Lane takes place December 14<sup>th</sup> at 5:30 pm and is says Paul, a fantastic opportunity for anyone interested in teaching to come and learn more about the scheme. "This year we are aiming to build up the numbers of high quality teachers available in Nottinghamshire and anyone interested in applying should act sooner rather than later. Attending this event could be the perfect beginning for aspirant teachers to enter a very healthy job market, and because our training scheme offers more support than ever before to trainees, it will smooth their path both during and after their qualification. There has never

been a better time to go for that career in Teaching you have always dreamed of, we may be biased at Cotgrave Candleby Lane and at Inspiring Leaders but we think it is the best job in the world!"

## Friends of Cotgrave Country Park

By the time you read this the park will almost have shed its autumn coat. The resplendent array of colours will start to make way for the bareness of winter. The summer birds will have left for warmer climes and the park will be in a state of shut down until the cycle starts again next spring.

That is a summary of nature in the park but for some there is no shut down and the Friends of Cotgrave Country Park have an interest in the park all year round. Since the last edition of Connections we have progressed with three items mentioned then. Firstly, the building of our website is going well and we aim to have it up and running soon. Once on stream we also hope to re-introduce our Face book page to run alongside it. If anyone has photos of the park we would love to see them and we can be contacted on the website. This is a new venture for us and no doubt there will be teething troubles so please bear with us.

The way marked footpaths are now complete and are with NCC for the appropriate sign posts to be made. It is then just a matter of installing them.

The mink problem is still ongoing and the use of special types of platform to trace their movements were brought in to help. Some success has been made regarding the recording of mink movement in two places within the park. This could have been more but on a sour note, some of the platforms have been vandalised and even moved. However the finding of mink is a result, albeit not one we want but steps will be taken to try and rid the park of this pest. We would welcome any sightings.

The park has had its winter cut, the grass bailed and removed. I must say it does seem to open up the park once this tall grass is removed. The footpath coming down to the lake from Colliers Way entrance has been resurfaced at long last and will be a welcome sight to those using that way in.

Unfortunately, on a sad note, the fishing club had to close Heron Lake for some weeks after a fish disease was found. The club acted immediately once this came to light and brought in experts from CEFAS a marine science body who have interests in aquatic environment. The disease was diagnosed as one confined to carp. The club put into place measures to rid the lake of the disease. No other fish were affected and there is no other risk involved to anyone. It is solely a disease that affects carp. Unfortunately the closure coincided with the club's annual charity fishing match in aid of Ash Lea School. The lake has now reopened.

Many of you will no doubt have witnessed the death of fish in the canal near lock 7 over the summer This has been ongoing every summer now for the last three or four years. The canal has nothing to do with our involvement in the country Park but I do get many phone calls reporting the dead fish in the summer months. Just recently I met with an engineer from the Canals and Rivers Trust to convey our concerns and to try to find a solution. The problem is caused by loss of water in that section of the canal and as a result there is a lack of oxygen resulting in the loss of fish. I was assured there was no leak to the lock and the water problem is caused because there is no reservoir to refill the lock and the water loss is due to natural seepage and evaporation. The only water source is from land runoff water hence during the winter and spring months the canal and lock is always full. It is an unfortunate problem that we will have to expect every year. However, in the case of the distressed and dying fish they (CRT) have asked for people to contact them at their Newark depot. It is their responsibility and they will deal with it.

On a successful note, many of you attended the bat walk in September. This was organised through the Nottingham branch of The Wildfowl Trust. It was a complete success with over 40 people taking part. Hopefully we may be able to use their expertise to organise other events within the park.

If you would like to know more about what's going on in the park or if you have your own ideas you would like to express then you are welcome to join our informal 6 weekly meeting at Cotgrave Futures. Dates will be announced on the Cotgrave Community Web site and on the park notice board in the Hollygate Lane car park. The final meeting of this year is on Tuesday 13<sup>th</sup> Dec at 7pm.

However, now we look to the future to our new project starting in January 2017. We are currently completing lots of training to uplift our skills to deliver a better quality of service in the new project. Some of the training includes:

- Addressing teen risk, raising self-esteem and building teen resilience.
- Mental health first aid
- Child sexual exploitation
- Coaching cricket level 2.

Late in August we took a group of young people to trek to the top of Mount Snowdon, this was a challenge that would stretch the young people. They had to dig deep and show real resilience to get to the top .... And then back down again, this I'm sure will stay with them for the rest of their lives and hopefully will show them that they can achieve anything if they are prepared to stick at it and focus. Positive Futures also supported the Ring Leas Park opening event. We ran a fitness circuit for all ages using the new equipment to complete exercises that will improve your fitness. Although the weather wasn't great it was good to see the amount of people that got involved in the circuit despite the rain.

Another project we are supporting is the Christmas Lights Event. Once again a group of young people will be leading on decorating Santa's Grotto. I will also be turning the lights on at the event, so I thank the Town Council for this opportunity.

Finally we ran two sessions during October half term. One youth, where young people took part in cake making and a Nurf gun shootout, and a sport session and multi-sport tournament. The young people took part in 3 sports—Dodgeball, Football and Kwik-Cricket. Throughout this week we saw 35 young people take part in our sessions.

#### Update on the Future

It was agreed by Rushcliffe Borough Council that the Positive Futures programme shall continue to deliver support to young people across Rushcliffe. We officially ceased to deliver our project work in Cotgrave in December 2014. However, Cotgrave Town Council have supported through funding, delivery for their young people and over the past two years we have delivered some great pieces of work with these young people.

Our Peer mentoring programme has seen local young people develop their knowledge in areas such as online safety, child sexual exploitation and psychoactive substances. This then allowed them to be able to advise and support other young people who may have issues with any of the topics.

One of the fist Peer mentors, Callum, is now a full member of the team completing his apprenticeship this year. He has shown passion and drive to improve opportunities and support for young people in Cotgrave.

Many of you may know that we have our office at the Welfare, despite not officially working in the area we have maintained a base here, our attendances are still the best in the Borough and we continue to support Cotgrave young people in the secondary schools that we work in.

As we embark on a new project that will run from January 2017 to December 2020 we have been commissioned to work in the following areas, Keyworth, Radcliffe-on-Trent, Bingham and East Leake.

After discussions with Cotgrave Town Council it seemed that there was some scope to ensure that whilst we deliver in these other areas that Cotgrave isn't forgotten and the Council has agreed to fund our work to run in line with the main project. This is great for young people now but also the younger ones coming through the ranks and finding their feet in the world. Our core age range is 10-16 working in both primary and secondary schools.

Many thanks to all our partners that have supported us over the past 7 1/2 years, Cotgrave Town Council, Candleby Lane School, (NCC) Young Peoples Support Services, Parkwood Leisure, our parents and young people.

Finally a big thanks to all young people, past, present and future that continue to value the support on offer, allowing us to ensure that young people have opportunities and a brighter future.
