

Update on Town Centre Regeneration and Employment Units at Hollygate Park

Work on the Town Centre has started! Shop units will be improved to provide a fresh new look, improvements will be made to the appearance of the back of the shops and the flats above the shop units will be converted in to a new business centre. All this work is due to be completed in Spring 2018.



Construction is also due to start on the Multi service centre which will house the GP's, police, library services and Rushcliffe Borough Council's contact point. Completion is expected in Summer 2018.

Once the Multi service centre is complete, the final phase of the project will be the demolition of the existing library and police building, improvements to the car park, and landscaping of the area.

The shopping centre will stay open for business during the construction works. Rushcliffe Borough Council and Cotgrave Town Council encourage residents to support their local shops during the improvements. Please shop locally and support your local businesses.

West Bridgford Shopmobility - Mobility When you Need It!



Shopmobility – not just shopping any more...

West Bridgford Shopmobility is a charity which helps people with mobility problems to enhance their quality of life, for an annual fee of just ± 10 , it provides mobility aids (wheelchairs, walkers and scooters) to enable them to visit shops and places of interest in the central West Bridgford area.

However, over their 14 years of operation, needs have changed, and Shopmobility has broadened its range of services to operate a short-term hire scheme (payable weekly), so it's now possible to take a scooter or wheelchair home with you. Or indeed, away with you... Look at the many benefits this provides:

Going on holiday in the UK?

You can hire a collapsible scooter, which can fit in the boot of a car (or the luggage compartment of a bus), so you can get around easily while you're away.

Guest with mobility problems?

If you have a visitor with mobility problems, we can provide you with a wheelchair or scooter for as long as you need it. **Been poorly, or just out of hospital?**

If you've been ill, or broken a leg, or are recuperating after a hospital stay, we can get you out and about again.

Blue badges? You don't have to be registered as disabled to take advantage of the Shopmobility service; scooters are fully insured, and you'll be given full training on how to use them.

The typical cost for the weekly hire of a lightweight scooter is just £30 for members, plus a refundable deposit.



OWTHORPE AND COTGRAVE BRANCH THE ROYAL BRITISH LEGION



31st July 2017 marks the centenary of the beginning of the Battle of Passchendaele; a battle lasting 100 days in the Ypres Salient, killing over half a million German and Allied soldiers. The battle saw soldiers from the Sherwood Foresters, defend the region south and east of the city of Ypres in thick quagmire, caused by weeks of relentless rain.

To honour the bravery and courage of the soldiers of the Sherwood Foresters who fought in this battle, Thomas Bee cycled from London to Ypres in July to raise money for the Royal British Legion. Day one saw Thomas, with the other RBL cyclists, ride out from Greenwich Park crossing the Kent Downs to Dover, covering a distance of 80 miles. On day two the RBL riders cycled from Calais to Abberville (90 miles), visiting the Etaples Military Cemetery 27 km from Boulogne. Etaples was the scene of immense concentration of Commonewealth reinforcement camps and hospitals, with many of the graves marking soldiers that died from wounds sustained in battle.



The ride went into the region of the Somme on the third day, travelling from Abberville to Arras (70 miles). That day's riding coincided with the 101st anniversary of the Battle of Somme and the RBL riders had the honour of taking park in the service at Thepival along side dignitaries from the British High Commission, Allied, French and German forces to mark the event.



The fourth day saw the cyclists ride into Ypres visiting Notre-Dame De Lorette International Memorial, a French World War One cemetery, and Tyne Cot. Notre-Dame Lorette International Memorial holds nearly 580,000 French soldiers and marks the contribution they made to the war. Tyne Cot, the largest Commonwealth War Graves Cemetery, is situated North East of Ypres and is the final resting place of nearly 12,000 servicemen who fought defending the city of Ypres. The ride finished by the passing under the Menin Gate, a memorial to the missing and those soldiers with no known grave. In the evening, the riders honoured those who had fallen in Flanders Field at the daily service of the sounding of the Last Post.

troops and their families returning from such battles and continue to support serving men and women, their families and veterans today.



Cotgrave & District U3A learn about the history of the Magna Carta

Our meeting began with éclat in the shape of an enthusiastic account of the history of Magna Carta by Vince Hughes, which maintained an admirable balance between the serious and the light-hearted. As the speaker pointed out, the subject of Magna Carta has been bedevilled by numerous Myths and Legends. Kipling took it seriously in describing it as the greatest document ever to be written, while, in fact, it was no more than a sort of Peace Treaty between King John and his warring factions of disgruntled barons. Many people believe it to be the document which enshrines our civil liberties but the truth is that, in its original form, it actually concerned none of us – only the few hundred aristocrats at the top of the pecking order. As far as the average villein, working in his Lordship's field, was concerned, it might as well not have happened. And, as far as its being a grand document, it extended to no more than a single sheet of A3, there were neither punctuation, nor paragraphs nor signatures – the proof of validity of any mediaeval document was, of course, provided by a seal, not a signature. Just how many (hand-written) copies of the Charta originally existed is unknown but we are assured that only four remain, one of which happens to be in Lincoln, one in Shrewsbury and two in the British Library. It was also extremely short-lived – did we realise that John had it annulled by the Pope after a mere matter of nine weeks? (Most of us didn't.) The fact that it needed to be re-instated on several occasions over the following years came as yet another surprise to your diligent scribe.

Who were these barons? Our speaker put them firmly into context. They were a crusty upper crust descended from the mercenary band of warriors who came with William the Conqueror in 1066, all their Anglo-Saxon predecessors having been 'axed' at William's behest. Half of them may have been Bishops but that didn't stop them from having mercenary interests. To understand such things, we were told, it is necessary to forget our twenty-first century prejudices and learn to see things from a thirteenth century viewpoint. The King literally 'owned' England and could therefore reward his favourites with gifts of land and (somewhat less acceptably?) take it away from those who had displeased him. Needless to say, such comings and goings demanded a political acumen with which King John was not overly-well accoutred. Not only did he fail to achieve a politically acceptable balance but he also contrived to lose most of England's French possessions and this, in turn, made it more difficult for him to satisfy the pecuniary demands of his insatiable followers. (By way of an aside, it struck me that the pecuniary demands of the typical human being appear to have changed little over the centuries but that may well be seen as an unworthy thought!) He also fell out with the Church, in the person of Bishop Steven Langton and, at one point, actually gave England to the Pope. Today, we may think that Brexit is something special but we just don't know the half of it!

Yet another aspect of this tumultuous reign concerns the fact the John should never have been King at all. He was the fifth son of King Henry II and Eleanor of Aquitaine and Henry should have been succeeded by his grandson, Arthur but John put paid to this by having Arthur murdered, thus depriving us of a second King Arthur. In 1215, towards the end of his reign, the Barons finally rebelled, tried to pin John down with the Magna Carta and, when John had it annulled, tried to replace him with a Frenchman, Louis (who eventually became Louis VIII of France). The country descended into chaos, in much the same manner as this despairing account is doing. Louis invaded, John Died (in Newark), there was a Battle of Lincoln Fair and a sea Battle of Sandwich (which again left us admitting ignorance). Finally Louis returned to France and, to everyone's relief, John was succeeded by the Plantagenet, Henry III. By way of summary, one can do worse than refer to the words of Seller and Yeatman: John was, indeed, a 'Bad King'.

John, himself, may well have been dead but Magna Carta was far from it. It came to life on numerous later occasions and our speaker emphasised two examples: it was used in attempts by Parliament to limit the Kingly excesses of Charles I and again by the American rebels to limit the excesses of George III but those obviously fall into the category of 'other stories'. I am happy to leave it at that.

The seasons go by so quickly in the park that by the time you read this the school holidays will have been and gone and the nights will be drawing in as we head towards autumn. The time of year, I'm sure you will agree, that the park puts on another display of splendid colour. To remind you of summer here are some images of flora and fauna I took in the park during the summer months.

Not a lot of activity has taken place during the summer but there are some quite important announcements which are worthy of a mention.

Firstly and most important. The Park Came Out Top. In the early part of the year Rushcliffe Borough Council ran a public survey to find the most favoured park and green space in the Borough. With around thirty or so locations the public voted and the winner was, by an overwhelming majority, Cotgrave Country Park. This was of great pleasure to me and the FoCCP members. It just goes to show what people appreciate and prefer. Nothing should be taken for granted. This just shows the public do take notice. Cotgrave was very fortunate to inherit the park from the old colliery site and now it has matured for all to enjoy. I gave reports to Rushcliffe Local News and the West Bridgford Wire and I hope, if you had the chance to read them, you enjoyed them. My gratitude goes to our very small band of volunteer wardens and other helpers who give their time freely to enhance the park for the benefit of others. It is also nice to see that Cotgrave is now recognised further afield because of the existence of the park. My biggest thanks must go to you, the park users for your vote.

The footpath system in the park is to be extended. NCC has had plans for some time to open up the old mineral railway line from the colliery. This is in the planning stage as I write. The path will be surfaced as a multi user footpath and will run

from the NW corner of the park just past the fishing lake and follow the old railway line to a point that bisects Holme Lane near Radcliffe. There will be entry/exit points on Stragglethorpe Road and the A52 road bridges. It will end at Holme Lane which is the road that runs from Radcliffe on Trent to Holme Pierrepont. You can turn left here and go onwards towards the Water Sports Centre and on even further to Trent Bridge this being a distance of approx 6 miles. Another route will be to turn right towards Radcliffe town centre a distance of approx 2 1/2 miles. This will no doubt be an opportunity to bring people into the park from further afield.

At the request of park users the earth bunds running adjacent to Heron Lake have been removed. These received a lot of negative reports as being unsightly and we agreed. They have been levelled off and returned to a grassed area which can be used for picnics. Another improvement project has been the excavation of land next to Leaky Hollow. You will have noticed the slope down to the water's edge has been cut into with a vertical wall with several holes in it. This, we are hoping, will naturalise into a Sand Martin bank. Nothing will happen this year now but hopefully it will attract the birds to the park next year. We are looking at ways to try and bring more water into the lake here, however it is such a large, costly and labour intensive plan that it will be ongoing for some time. Another completed project has been the construction of a footbridge across the outflow culvert at the North end of Heron Lake. This will allow a safer crossing to gain access to the other side of the lake.

One of the other improvements we wish to see is the tidying of the car park area on Hollygate Lane. The large tree there was left in situ by the builders and had become covered with ivy and lots of the lower trunk had sprouted new branch growth. This has now been cleared and most of the ivy removed. We hope to sow a wild flower seed mix around it and also line the edge of the car park with the same seed. The selection of fruit trees and bushes around the park appears to be more abundant this year.
