News from Plastic Free Cotgrave

On Saturday 26th April, Plastic Free Cotgrave organised a successful **litter pick** in and around the centre of the village. Over 20 people took part, including families, individuals, James Naish MP and a range of councillors, 15 bags of litter and rubbish were collected, leaving the village centre in a pristine condition!

The group is planning its next litter pick on Saturday 12th July, between 11.00am and 12.00 noon, starting at the Community Garden on Candleby Lane. As always, litter picking equipment will be provided, along with reusable bags and protective gloves.



In April, Cotgrave U3A became official allies of Plastic Free Cotgrave. If your group would like to sign up as allies, visit the Plastic Free Cotgrave website (Community Teams) for further information.

Cotgrave is proud to be among the many communities across the UK taking action against throw-away plastic. In 2021, Cotgrave was awarded Plastic Free Community status by the marine conservation charity, Surfers Against Sewage, in recognition of their strides made in tackling single-use plastics at source.



Belvoir Health Patient Participation Group (PPG)

Our group meets regularly and has input from the surgeries. We cover the surgeries in Bingham, Cotgrave and Cropwell Bishop.

At an extraordinary meeting earlier this spring, we were joined by our MP, James Naish, and Matt Prior, member of the Royal Pharmaceutical Society.

It was an interesting meeting, with members able to raise any subject they like. James has strong family links to the NHS – his wife is a doctor – which gives him both political and practical insights into the concerns raised by the group on issues including NHS funding, A&E organisation, staff retention and drug access.

It was encouraging to hear of some national improvements including £800 million extra for community pharmacy, and some local improvements including reducing ambulance response times for Category 2 patients by 20 minutes – but James said that there was a long way to go to restore confidence in the reliability and quality of NHS services. We were shocked to learn that 20% of children's admissions to hospital are related to their teeth! More NHS dentist appointments are needed quickly alongside better dental health at home.

Many patients in hospital are well enough to leave but need support in their home. Locally this winter, with \pounds 14 million extra from the government, the number of adult patients stuck in hospital beds every day in Nottinghamshire dropped by up to two-thirds. This is a big improvement but demonstrates the need for better ongoing partnership work between the health and social sectors and our local authority.

Matt was able to explain why patients who are waiting to be discharged from hospital have to wait so long for the necessary prescriptions. The hospital pharmacy has to prioritise those who are still ill and in beds or A&E. Doctors have to fill out the prescriptions at the end of ward rounds. Patients have to be clear how to take the medications and say what medicines they have at home, prescriptions are sent to the busy pharmacy and then dispensed. Then medicines have to be delivered back to the ward where a nurse gets them to the patient. It was a real insight into how pressured all of these professionals are, and a realisation that our NHS still does an amazing job on the whole in difficult circumstances.

Cotgrave Police A report from PC 153 Matt Pooley



Sadly, wherever I have worked as a Police officer there are always concerns around Illegal Drug Use and Dealing. Illegal drug use and dealing have serious legal, health, and social consequences that can impact your future. The local Neighbourhood Police Team have conducted several warrants across the Rushcliffe area in recent months which have resulted in cash, drugs and vehicles being seized as well as several arrests and pending prosecutions.

Legal Consequences

Possession – Being caught with illegal drugs can lead to a warning, fine, community service, or prison sentence (depending on the type and amount).

Dealing/Supply – Selling, distributing, or even giving drugs to a friend is a serious crime, punishable by up to life imprisonment and an unlimited fine.

Driving Under the Influence – Driving while on drugs is illegal and can lead to a driving ban, fine, or prison time.

Criminal Record – A conviction can limit job opportunities, travel (e.g., visa restrictions for the US, and Australia), and education prospects.

Health Consequences

Physical Health Risks – Drugs can cause heart problems, organ damage, overdose, or even death. Mental Health Issues – Increased risk of anxiety, depression, paranoia, and psychosis. Addiction & Dependency – Many drugs are highly addictive, leading to long-term struggles with substance abuse.

Social Consequences

Strained Relationships – Drug use can damage family and friendships.

Financial Problems – Addiction often leads to debt and crime to fund drug habits.

Gang & Violence Risks – Getting involved in drug dealing increases exposure to violent crime. Prevention & Support

Drug Treatment Programs – Help is available through the NHS, local rehab centres, and charities like FRANK (0300 123 6600).

Anonymous Reporting – If you suspect drug dealing, you can report it to Crimestoppers (0800 555 111) or 101.

You can keep up to date with Policing issues in your area is by signing up to Notts Alert. This is your local community alert system. It provides free timely updates from organisations you can trust as well as an easy way to have your say about policing where you live. please visit www.nottsalerts.co.uk for more information.



CHAIRMAN'S REPORT 2024-2025

There have been several challenges this year, but in every case our Town Clerk and the Admin Manager have risen to the challenge and any problems have been overcome.

During the year one of our grounds men – Len Knight of many years standing, retired and has been replaced by a temporary member of staff.

We started the year with a number of vacancies on the Council and earlier this year we held an Open Event at Cotgrave Futures with the objective of explaining to interested residents what was required to become a councillor. I am pleased to say that the event was successful and two residents applied to be co-opted onto the Council. They were duly co-opted by the existing councillors and attended their first Council meeting in April.

As usual, we held the summer event which was well supported by a number of stalls and other attractions including a 'Have a go at skateboarding' which the younger generation thoroughly enjoyed.

The main events of the year were the Remembrance Day service and wreath laying ceremony. We were honored to have HM The King's representative The Deputy Lord Lieutenant Christine Goldstraw joined us for the event and the subsequent RBL lunch held at the Nottinghamshire Golf and Country Club.

The next event was the firework display held at The Welfare. The numbers attending was the highest ever and they were treated to a magnificent display and the increased measures to ensure safety did not impede on the enjoyment of everyone watching.

We then held the Pensioners' Lunch which 160 residents attended. The lunch was excellent, the fun and friendship that ensued underlined the success of the event and its importance to our senior residents.



The final event of the Council year was the Commemoration of VE day. A good number attended the evening which was marked by The Reverend Paul Massey who read the tribute which was followed by the hymn 'I vow to thee my country' and closed with the lighting of the beacons.



In order to maintain the work undertaken by the Council it has regrettably necessitated increasing the precept which is included in your Council Tax by approximately £10 per year. The main reason causing this increase was the cost of National Insurance paid by the employer – CTC. Every effort was made to avoid this increase, but short of cutting services it was unavoidable.

I feel we have ended the last year in a strong position to be able to provide for Cotgrave's residents the best value for money in every respect which is our main objective.

We are looking forward to the next year, with several projects to be considered and hopefully some implemented.
